While riding the Taiwan tourist shuttle, apart from enjoying the enchanting landscape passing by the bus windows and the different musical accompaniments in each vehicle, with your personal smartphone you can also scan the QR code on each seat, and listen to well-known author Kexiang Liu as he shares his traveling experiences while guiding you along the route. Press the bell to get off the bus, and you'll receive one of many surprises that will delight you on this trip!



# Discovering the Hot Springs and Beauties of Beitou

# Unveil the Mysteries

Over 300 years ago, there's a place in today's Taipei where "trees don't grow, and the earth boils." The inhabitants, the Ketagalan plains aborigines, called this place Patauw, meaning "home of the witches." The pungent smell and thick fumes could mean just one thing—there was strange sorcery going on here. With time the name became Beitou in Chinese, and today, centuries later, this is still a beloved tourist spot.

In the days of Japanese occupation (1895-1945) the Japanese came across Beitou's secrets and treasure. While hot-spring inns opened one by one, a railway line and station were put up. Its fame as a holiday oasis attracted royalties to savor its charms. Today, travelers continue coming from near and far to soak up the lovely natural scenery and dip in the comfortable hot-spring resort amenities.

Perhaps there was indeed witchcraft practiced here amidst the coiling steam and smoke. Today Beitou becomes a place of nature's bounty on exhibit, of cultured living, of hot spring refinement—of a famed rest and relaxation jewel. You can be assured to enjoy the sumptuous joys of mineral-spring soaking pleasure and to unearth the many stories of this valley of

fascination.

# Taiwan Folk Arts Museum (Beitou Museum) (北投文物館)

This is a privately owned museum and also a heritage site. Built in 1921, it was the premium hot-spring inn in the Beitou area in its day-the Kazan Inn. The Taipei City Government declared it an official city heritage site in 1998. Today, this is Taiwan's largest example of pure wood-built two-story Japanese architecture, measuring approximately 1,000 square meters. The museum is home to more than 4,000 examples of traditional Taiwan folk arts and handicrafts as well as indigenous-tribe relics; there are artifact displays, arts and cultural performances, meetings and banquets, venue rentals, creative Kaiseki cuisine service, and an array of cultural experience courses, all offered in the guest to make this a new and diverse cultural-creative park.

# Longnaitang Hot Spring Bath (瀧乃湯)

This hot spring bath was built around 1907 and originally intended for the therapeutic benefit of Japanese soldiers during the Japanese occupation era. After Taiwan's liberation from Japan, the female bath was constructed with Qilian rock, the quarrying of which is banned. Both male and female springs are modest and simple in design, and bathers are naked. A stone monument in the center of the courtyard commemorates a visit from Japanese Crown Prince Showa. # Marshal Zen Garden (少帥禪園)

This facility was originally the home of the Xingao Hotel during the Japanese occupation era (1895-1945). During WWII it was used as a hostel for kamikaze pilots, and as a venue for the entertainment of high officials. In 1960 it became the home of former Northeastern Chinese warlord Marshal Zhang Xueliang, who had been placed under house arrest. The buildings of the complex today still have the black tile common to old-style Japanese architecture, a rarity in Taiwan, and a Marshal Zhang memorial pavilion. This is a place of nostalgia and tranquility as well as a place for fine dining and hot-spring soaking in a garden setting with majestic mountain views.

# Puji Temple (普濟寺)

Built in 1905, it is a rare example of temple architecture practiced by the Shingon (True Words) sect of Japanese Vajrayana Buddhism. The main deity is the Tangshou Guanyin (protector of hot-springs), deeply revered by Beitou folk. The wooden hall, curving pillars, and bell-shaped windows evoke the aesthetics of Japan's Edo period.

# Tourist Spots

#### ■ Plum Garden (梅庭)

This was once the summer getaway home for famed Chinese calligrapher Yu Youren, the "cursive calligraphy master of the generation." Built in the late 1930s, it has a distinctive architectural style, with a Japanese timber structure and an elegant, tree-shaded courtyard. Declared a city heritage building in 2006, there is a visitor information center, and exhibits on the building's history and architecture. Plum Garden is open to public and entry is free.

The new interactive Plum Garden Cloud Guide System is now up and running, providing 3D reality navigation services. Link up from the cloud and immediately begin exploring the many charms of this complex.

# Beitou Hot Spring Museum (北投溫泉博物館)

Originally called the Beitou Public Baths, this was built in 1913, at that time East Asia's largest hot-spring public bath. Today it is the key showcase for hot springs-related historical relics in Beitou, and there is the



rare hokutolite or "Beitou Stone" on display. Roman-style arches and columns in the first floor common bath merge perfectly with Japanese-style interior and tatami on the second floor.

# Taipei Public Library Beitou Branch (Beitou Library) (臺北市立圖書館北投分館)

This is Taiwan's first eco-friendly library set up with energy-saving green ideas. It utilizes solar power, the rooftop is a cooling green oasis, and all rainwater is collected and recycled. Readers are calmed with pleasant mountain vistas through sun-inviting tall French windows. Time spent in the tree-shaded outdoor reading areas is more like time spent in a dreamscape rather than your normal library experience. (Due to renovation, all services are temporarily unavailable until June 21st, 2014)

# Ketagalan Culture Center (凱達格蘭文化館)

This is Taiwan's first multifunctional cultural center dedicated to its indigenous peoples, and commemorates the fact this area was originally home to the plains-dwelling Ketagalan people. On the second/third floors are permanent exhibits on the cultures of Taiwan's indigenous peoples; other floors have facilities for meetings, performances, library services, seminars, and classes on indigenous languages and other subjects. This is a fine place to learn more about Taiwan's indigenous life, culture, and arts.

In the name "Yinguang Lane," the "yin" referring to the bankemployee dormitories once found here, and the "guang" is the same as that used in the famous Shanguang Temple, which still stands at the end of the lane. Local residents and in-theknow travelers have long made this lane a sort of private scenicsight destination. The area is characterized by lush, tall green trees, creating a secluded hideaway awaiting discovery and exploration.

# ■ Thermal Valley (地熱谷)

The Thermal Valley was once considered to be one of Taiwan's eight great natural wonders. The green sulphur waters are distinctive and peculiar. The smoke and mist rising up out of the catch basin and curling up the mountains, and the translucentgreen waters, have given rise to the names Jade Springs Valley and Hell Valley, a place of wonder and fantasy in the old days.

# Guizikeng Water and Soil Conservation Education Park (貴子坑水土保持教學園區)

In the past this place was called "The Pit of Ghost." It was valued as a source of white clay for ceramics. Ceramics production flourished here during the Japanese occupation era, with much praised and sold near and far. In 1989, this natural depression was converted to a conservation area that is used as an outdoor education venue. The name was changed to the homonymous Guizikeng, with a more harmonious meaning "Pit of the Eminence."

# ■ Guandu Nature Park (關渡自然公園)

Located near Taiwan's north coast at the confluence of the Tamsui and Keelung rivers, this is a key stopping point for migratory birds and a warm home for myriad animal and plant species. The park is currently managed by Taipei City Government through the Wild Bird Society of Taipei. As an important wetland-environment education and learning center that features open grassland, wooden boardwalks, and birdwatching huts, with information signage and guided tours, the park provides the most natural way to give people

#### Charcoal Kilns

In pioneer days Beitou dwellers would cut down the area's acacia trees to make charcoal for use as fuel. They used local stone and bricks made from local clay to construct charcoal kilns, and at its zenith the industry had a giant cluster of over 50 kilns in total. Today charcoal is little used as a fuel resource, but the remains of the kilns are an important local cultural heritage.

# Motorcyle Delivery Service

During the Japanese occupation era, the rise of the Beitou hot-spring industry was abrupt. The mountain area made transportation somewhat inconvenient, and the area's unique motorcycle delivery service network arose. People were carried to and from the area, as were goods, and riders even handled shopping and personalized delivery. Today, with riders on call 24 hours a day, serving local businesses and residents, the uniquely local tradition is again flourishing.

#### Nakashi

The term "nakashi" in Japanese refers to traveling minstrels that move among inns and public houses entertaining patrons. Most nakashi performers perform in pairs, one playing and one singing. Beitou was the fountainhead for the nakashi culture in Taiwan, the tradition brought in to entertain homesick Japanese clients at Beitou's hot-spring inns. Many remarkable players can remember hundreds of melodies


#### Beitou Stone and Qilian Stone

Beitou has two famous stones that have served as precious natural resources. One is Beitou stone, an extremely rare type of ore that contains radium. There is a large sample preserved in the Beitou Hot Spring Museum. The other is called Qilian Stone, by nature highly refractory, in the past much valued as a building material, and today a sight that is rarely seen.

#### Introduction of the Beitou Mineral Waters

The Beitou hot springs are sulfurous. Before heading out for a soaking session, let's learn a little about the water characters and the tips of hot springs bathing, which will make the experience even more enjoyable.

#### Green sulfur:

The waters in and around Thermal Valley are acidic sulphatechloride springs, pellucid and green-tinted like jade. Places to enjoy the green sulfur waters include Beitou Park Outdoor Hot Spring Bathing Pool, and Shinshukaku Hotel.

#### White sulfur:

The local source of sulfur are in fact sulfurous-gas fumaroles rather than hot springs. It is the local Yangmingshan waters pouring into these depressions that creates usable hot spring waters. Pure, clean, the color milky white, with only a light sulfurous smell, local folk affectionately refer to them as "milk springs." The majority of Beitou's hot spring hotels and inns pipe in white sulphur waters.

#### Iron sulphur:

The springs located in the upstream mountain-valley area called Ding Beitou (top of Beitou), north of Shuangchong Stream, upper reaches of Nanhuang Stream, and around the Yangming Park, are neutral carbonate. Transparent waters are characterized by iron precipitate, as a result called iron sulfur hot spring.

# **Bathing Tips**

- Generally we recommend multiple 15-minute sessions for each bath, but no more than 3 baths a day. If you are sweating too much or if your heart rate reaches higher than 120 bmp, it indicates the bathing is overdone.
- A rest of one hour before a hot spring bath is highly recommended.
- If you feel palpitation or dizziness, slowly step out of the bath and take a short break. Do not re-enter the hot spring until these symptoms have vanished.
- Elderly bathers and those with weak hearts should not sit in a hot spring bath, but are recommended to rest their heads on the side of the bath, stretch out their legs and arms and float on the water.
- Elderly bathers should bathe with a partner or friend.
- When entering a hot spring bath, try to avoid entering close to the hot water inflow. A moderate water temperature is more comfortable and more effective. A suitable water temperature for bathing is between 38-42°C; no higher than 45°C.
- While bathing, relaxation reinforces the therapeutic effects of the hot spring.
- Unless you have sensitive skin, don't wash off the bath water; simply dry your body and hair with a towel to allow the hot spring chemicals to help your body retain heat
- Remember to always stay hydrated while bathing.
- Avoid excessive eating before and after bathing.
- Do not smoke, or drink alcohol, coffee or strong tea while bathing.



Exit MRT Xinbeitou Station, begin your walk by moving uphill along Zhongshan Road, you'll almost immediately arrive at the Ketagalan Culture Center, situated across from Beitou Park. The earliest known inhabitants of the area were the Ketagalan plains aborigines. They thought witches lived here and bestowed the name "Patauw" (witches' abode) on this place, later morphing into the Chinese "Beitou." The center hosts various displays, performances, symposiums, and other activities to introduce Taiwan's 14 tribes, recording and proclaiming their culture and development.

Beitou Park, which sits between Zhongshan and Guangming roads as they move apart, sits Taipei Public Library Beitou Branch. It is a eco-friendly complex with only wood, steel and other recyclable materials used in its construction. The space is carpeted in green shade, making a day immersed in the glories of the book, a quiet, pleasant gem indeed.

Roman-style bathing pool as its distinctive feature. Both Crown Prince Hirohito and Dr. Sun Yat-sen were attracted by its fame and came to visit. After visiting continue up Zhongshan Road and vou'll come to Plum Garden, the former residence of famed calligrapher Yu Youren, now a fine exhibit of the traditional Japanese timber-frame structure. Taipei City Government renovated the facilities with a visitor information center and has it open to the public.

Next, walking up a flight of stone steps you'll come to Puji Temple. Whether here to worship or just to admire the Japanese architectural mastery, you'll find a sense of tranquil calm settling over you. Continuing uphill toward Liuhuang Valley, you come to what was once the upscale Kazan Inn, today's Beitou Museum. Among its attractions are a traditional Japanese-style courtyard and an expansive banquet hall. There are also special exhibits on a variety of themes, cultural experience programs, and both fine dining and tea venues. Visitors enjoy a comfortable space while taking a trip down memory lane.

Just up the road is Marshal Zen Garden, formerly the home of the Marshal Zhang Xueliang, today a restaurant featuring fine dining set amidst a graceful landscape.



# Hot Springs and Fine-Foods Tour

If arriving at MRT Beitou Station before noon, a leisurely saunter through Beitou Market is a good idea. The market has over 200 stalls, a "must" for authentic local snacking treats.

After eating to your palate's content at the market, take a walk of 10-15 minutes heading for the hot spring tour. If you want to grasp the Beitou hot spring cultural phenomenon and its splendor, you can visit the Beitou Hot Spring Museum for culture immersion in depth. As you digest both food and knowledge, the road to Beitou hot spring dipping opens before you.

Beyond the many hot spring inns and hotels to choose from, there is a special spot that must be mentioned, the Beitou Park Outdoor Hot Spring Bathing Pool, beside the Beitou Hot Spring Museum, which has six areas of differing temperature, from low to high. The mineral waters piped in are the green sulfur waters of nearby Thermal Valley. You can soak for hours for just a little fee, with superb mountainous views around.

After a thorough refreshing of body and spirit, a pilgrimage to the







most important source of the Beitou story—Thermal Valley. This is a place of unique geographical and geological character. All year round the deep Thermal Valley is thick with curling smoke and fumes and the odor of sulfur. It is easy to understand why there is the legendary witch. This walking tour brings you the classic Beitou mix—good food, good dipping, great scenery—worthy to reserve a full day to meander at length.

Exiting MRT Xinbeitou Station, Beitou Park is directly ahead. Long and thin, it moves up the narrow Beitou Stream valley. Breathing the fresh air, you get a good feeling for the Beitou green-living style. Beitou Park pleases the eyes with arched stone bridges, pavilions, and the "guitar bridge" (from the name of a 1966 film shot here). In one corner is a wild duck fountain, a well-known early Beitou attraction that later disappeared. To recapture the charm it brought to the park in days gone by and celebrate the park's centenary, a formal opening ceremony of the restored fountainhead was staged in June 2013.

Beitou Park No. 2, near No. 5 Zhongshan Road, has long been a familiar Beitou Park section. A playground was long ago set up here for children to use when adults came to enjoy the hot springs, and though the facilities were simple, including slides, swings, and seesaws, they remain the source of fond childhood memories for many Beitou residents. To bring back the radiance of bygone days, after nearly a full year of renovation and expansion, Beitou Park No. 2 is now creating a whole new set of memorable retro-style experiences.

Within the park is what is called the "library in the forest," the first

green library in the country, fully eco-friendly. This is the Taipei Public Library Beitou Branch. With its design concept that "the building is part of the environment" makes it a must-visit spot to enjoy the green-life harmony.

The Beitou Stream is one of Taiwan's most unique waterways, with numerous tiny waterfalls along its course. These formed natural spa pools in the old days, and in the even older days were the green mineral water gestation spots for the rare Beitou Stone. It is fabled that the minerals, which carry minor radioactive properties, have therapeutic effects although no formal study has been able to prove so empirically. Thermal Valley, the Beitou Stream's source, is also a unique work of nature's art, its pool filled with minute green-tint particles that give it the appearance of liquid jade.

The terrain along quiet Yinguang Lane, lined with tall trees, was formed by volcanic lava. Rich with tropical, temperate, and cold zone plant life, it is especially abundant in fern species. Ferns came into existence some 400 million years ago, and thrive along damp stream sides and rock walls. At lane's end is Shanguang Temple, built in 1932, perched on high ground and surrounded by Mt. Datun and Mt. Danfeng. The expansive view is riveting, overlooking Beitou, the Guandu Plain, the Tamsui River, and Mt. Guanyin.

If interested in Beitou's volcanic geology, take a vehicle up to Liuhuang (Sulfur) Valley to see the sulfur fumaroles and hot springs. Bluegrass were once cultivated in the Mt. Datun range; farmers engaged in both indigo dye production and sale. To learn about traditional indigo dye craftsmanship and create your own unique cotton scarf, make a reservation with the Beitou Culture Foundation, then head up Mt. Shamao for a creative DIY indigo-dveing experience tour.

Beitou's rich natural scenery and attractive terrain keep people coming back. In Beitou you're pampered in every way: hot-spring soaking, eco-touring, fine foods, and much more, the perfect holiday getaway spot.

Another key in the sophisticated approach to fine living in Beitou is the fine foods. The authentic local snacks and many eateries have made this area a choice for culinary adventure. Before returning home with a happy heart you'd be wise to pick up some of the gift and souvenir items on offer, spreading the joy of fond memories of your pleasant Beitou outing.

#### Beitou's Tavern Dishes

Tavern dishes were first introduced to Beitou during the Japanese occupation era when many hot-spring resorts and inns were opened in the area. The Japanese imported nakashi, a form of music and dance entertainment traditionally performed at Japanese questhouses. The tavern dishes of Beitou are influenced by Japanese, Sichuanese, Cantonese, and Taiwanese cuisines. Prepared by creative and skilled chefs who put an emphasis on presentation the dishes are a feast for the palate and the eves. Experiencing Beitou's tavern dishes is a great way to learn about Beitou's past and its culinary roots.

#### Authentic Snacks

Beitou Market, beside MRT Beitou Station, is a snack-lover's heaven, selling an array of treats at finger-tingling fair prices: steaming hot-from-the-pot snacks, tasty cold beverages etc. The long menu of choices found at a raucous night-market without the noise and pulsing crowds of that in night markets.

The many venerable old-shops are places locals have been coming since they were kids. Among your many possibilities, the Caiyuanyi shop serves up fragrant black and green teas. Shangquan Rougeng serves fresh, sticky meat-based soup. Aizicai Lurou Fan offers tasty braised pork rice. A-Chou





Dingbiancuo has delicious jijuan or meat rolls and dingbiancuo, pot-rim noodle pancakes. All these are old-time market favorites with Beitou locals.


#### Famous Foods

In winter there's also sweet hot soups with such tasty things as grass jelly, red bean, and peanuts to warm up your day.

The tankan is grown in Beitou's "backyard," i.e., up on Yangmingshan. This is a specialty product at Chinese New Year, loaded with auspicious symbolism, and thus also called the New Year tangerine in Chinese. Yangmingshan tankans are meaty, sweet with a hint of sourness, and brimming with fruity fragrance. Tankan Soft Candy Cakes are made by first slowly boiling the tankans to make them gelatinous, then wrapping the meat inside a walnut shortbread skin — a tasty treat that is a great Beitou souvenir purchase.

#### The Witch Series Souvenir


